What is the Stony Stratford Neighbourhood Plan?

Neighbourhood Plans are a way for communities to decide the future of the places where they live and work. They were introduced in the Localism Act 2011 as a way of letting people who know and care for an area, plan for it. Neighbourhood planning is about building neighbourhoods and planning positively for development - not stopping growth. The Act explains how communities can get more involved in planning for their areas - specifically how they can create plans and policies to guide new development and, in some cases, grant planning permission for certain types of development. The Stony Stratford Neighourhood Plan (encompassing Stony Stratford, Fullers Slade and Galley Hill) sets out planning policies and aspirations to guide how the local community wants the parish to look over the next 10-15 years in terms of new development, building design and the protection and improvement of community facilities, parking, local services and open spaces. A key element of the Plan is how to maintain the economic vitality of our High Street and local economy whilst trying to ensure that people can walk and cycle safely around the parish area.

In Stony Stratford, we have been working on the development of a Neighbourhood Plan since late 2012. Initially a steering group comprising town councillors, residents from Stony Stratford, Fullers Slade and Galley Hill together with members of the Business Association and other local groups worked to develop the Plan that you will be asked to vote on in a referendum on **Thursday 3rd May 2018.**

The Plan has been through the following stages:
- Stage 1: Define the Area - The Neighbourhood Plan area was designated on 28th May 2013

- Stage 2: Prepare the Plan: The Steering Group developed the proposals which were consulted on with the public and statutory consultees. The completed plan was submitted to Milton Keynes Council in June 2016. The publicity period was held between 29th June to 10th August 2016.
- Stage 3: Independent Check: Milton Keynes Council appointed an independent examiner, Mr John Slater, to review whether the Stony Stratford Plan was in general conformity with higher level plans, and if so, whether it should proceed to referendum. The Independent Examiner concluded that the plan, if amended in line with his recommendations, meets all the statutory requirements.

A summary of the Policies follows. The full policies, maps and aspirations can be found at www.stonystratford.gov.uk/planning/neighbourhood-plan.

Policy 1 - Sustaining and Enhancing the Main Shopping/Commercial/Employment Area: Any proposals or planning applications within the town centre will be considered in the context of the health and vitality of the shopping and commercial/employment area.

Policy 2 - Cofferidge Close: Any redevelopment of the parts of Cofferidge Close within the primary shopping area shall be a mix of shops, businesses, hotels and non-residential

institutions (please see the full Neighbourhood Plan for a glossary of the terms) or proposals for any alterations to the non-residential elements shall preserve and enhance the conservation area and the setting of any adjoining listed building.

Policy 3 - Market Square: There will be a presumption against the further loss of ground floor commercial or retail uses. The change of use or redevelopment of the doctor's surgery and related health facilities for other uses will not be approved unless the equivalent facilities have been replaced elsewhere within the town centre. Improvements to pavements, carriageways, lighting, signage, seating and street furniture be harmonised with the town centre, and any development proposals will be required to support this policy where it is appropriate

Policy 4 - Plough Corner - Wolverton/London Road Junction: Any redevelopment of this site shall provide a combination of town centre uses, to achieve a more intensive, balanced and mixed -use development appropriate to the conservation area. New development should be locally distinctive in a style sympathetic to, and sustaining the significance of, the adjacent listed buildings which are to be retained and protected. Any redevelopment of this site shall reflect the importance of achieving a scheme of visual and architectural prominence

Policy 5 - Shopfront Improvements: Any proposed changes to shopfronts or signage shall be undertaken of a high standard of design as set out in the Design Guide (and successor documents). Any alterations to shop fronts in the town centre should contribute positively to the character of the conservation area and to the quality of the building and street-scene.

Policy 6 – Sustaining and Enhancing Fullers Slade Local Centre: The mix of activities at the local centre shall include a retail store, other shops/services and where possible should be enhanced. Proposals which reduce or erode the scale or mix of activities at the Fullers Slade local centre will be resisted. A residential development on the Cavendish site would be supported with a community/training/workshop facility if appropriate.

Policy 7 – Sustaining and Enhancing Galley Hill Local Centre: The mix of activities at the local centre shall include a retail store, professional services, food and drink, hot food and takeaway and the community/arts facility. Proposals which enhance the activities and help maintain the fabric of the buildings will be encouraged.

Policy 8 - Enhancing Residential Amenity: New development which is contrary to the provisions of the Design Guide (and successor documents) and/or has a detrimental impact on the lives of people, as a result of poor design, inappropriate parking provision, accessibility, design or flooding will not be permitted.

Any proposals for development where relevant shall be considered against the criteria within the Design Guide and the impact on residential amenity, parking, accessibility, design and flooding, and where appropriate should take into account opportunities to address existing deficiencies in residential amenity in the area of the development. Any proposals for residential development will also be considered against other relevant policies in the Neighbourhood

Plan especially 1,9,10,11,12, 13 and 15.

Policy 9 - Development Proposals: The following sites within the parish are identified for development to support the Plan's aims and objectives:

- the Northern Gateway, comprising the former caravan sales and gasworks sites on the eastern side of Stony Stratford High Street, for either commercial uses (B1 Business use class, possibly C1 hotel) or a more mixed-use development combining residential and commercial uses, with a quality of design recognising the position at the northern entrance to Stony Stratford and the adjacent conservation area.
- the growth of new or expanding businesses and the redevelopment of the former tram shed in St. Mary's Avenue as a centre for small and starter enterprises, possibly incorporating adjoining site(s) with an improved access from Russell Street and improvements to parking and garaging, or for residential development. Due to the importance of the former tram depot to the town's history, a heritage assessment should be made of the former tram depot and this should inform any (re)development proposals. the current St Giles residential home off Russell Street should be redeveloped for residential purposes to provide care and/or affordable homes for elderly and young people. The scale and design of the new development should reflect the quality of the location and its heritage, and provide if possible opportunities to improve vehicular access in the area the re-development of Plough Corner (see policy 4)
- the 'Southern Gateway' site, situated between London Road/Queen Eleanor Street and Ridgeway, could include the on-going use of Queen Eleanor School and Watling Way Centre for education, recreation and community uses, with possible integration with the Galley Hill local centre (see policy 7)
- the Cavendish site in Fullers Slade developed for a combination of residential and community/ training/workshop facility (see policy 6).

The residential development proposals described in this policy will be considered in light of the policies in this Plan, and the impact on nearby residential amenity, parking, accessibility, design, and flooding.

Proposals for residential development shall provide affordable housing provision in accordance with the standards with the Milton Keynes Core Strategy or successor documents (and the Affordable Housing Supplementary Planning Document).

Policy 10 - Protect and Enhance Social, Sporting, Play, Cultural and Community Facilities: The change of use of the current range of sporting, social, cultural, and play facilities will not be permitted and opportunities shall be sought from any development proposals to improve these.

The change of use of the current range of community facilities within the parish, particularly York House, Watling Way Centre, and the Children's Centre on Moorfoot and the building holding the former Sp@ce Children's Centre on London Road will not be permitted.

Where there is a proposal for the loss of sporting, social, cultural, play and community facilities, this will only be acceptable where a replacement facility of equivalent size, quality and convenience is provided within the Parish.

Policy 11 – Car Parking Provision: The current capacity and balance of car parking in the town shall be maintained. There is a presumption against loss of existing public car parking provision unless an equivalent number of replacement spaces have been provided in alternative, appropriate locations elsewhere in the town centre.

Policy 12 – Enhancing the Parish's Heritage and Public Realm: Applicants will demonstrate within design and access statements, when required, how proposals have sought to preserve and enhance the significance of the conservation area and how the design has had regard to the

advice contained within the Stony Stratford Design Guide (and successor documents).

Policy 13 - Protect and Enhance Open Space Within the Parish: This Plan designates as Local Green Space the landscaped areas in Cofferidge Close

In addition the following areas are identified where no reduction in the extent and quality of the open space will be permitted: Horsefair Green; Millfield; Mortimer Park; Higlin's Piece; "Spider Park" on Fullers Slade; Wolverton Road Recreation Ground; The undeveloped space behind York House; Ancell Trust Sports Ground.

We are now at Stage 4: Local Referendum and the plan (V21) will go forward to a referendum of local electors to be held on **Thursday 3rd May 2018** (the same day as the elections to Milton Keynes Council). The question that will be asked is as follows: "Do you want Milton Keynes Council to use the neighbourhood plan for Stony Stratford to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?"

People on the electoral register in the parish of Stony Stratford (including Fullers Slade and Galley Hill) will be entitled to vote in the referendum. If more than 50% of those voting in the referendum vote 'yes', then Milton Keynes Council is required to bring the plan into force and use its policies when considering planning applications in the plan area.

Finally, The Town Council would like to thank everyone who was instrumental in the formation of **YOUR** Plan and would encourage you to vote in the forthcoming referendum.

Stony Stratford Town Council Precept 2018/19 Changes occurring in government today affect services provided by Parish and Town Councils and setting a precept is a difficult decision for a Council to take lightly. Taking into account year on year reductions in grant from Milton Keynes Council, (According to the MKC Parish and Town Council Tax Base and provisional funding allocations document, this Council has in real terms had a 5.64% loss in income), rising inflation and continuing to provide services for the local community, loss of grants for provision of the Citizen's Advice Service, updating old IT equipment, additional compliance costs for the new General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) plus the major works to improve the Mill Lane Car Park, and, it is hoped, create additional car parking spaces, this Town Council has reluctantly agreed to increase the precept by 10% to £197,207. The total expenditure for the Council for the coming year will amount to £277,468 after taking into account grants received, income raised and use of reserves which means that a Band D property will increase this year to £78.82 (2017/18 - £71.75), an increase of £7.07 per annum per household. Below is a summary of some of the services we

5 - 7 Church Street (the Library) is the main asset owned by the Town Council and expenditure includes the upkeep of the building for use by Town Council, Library and community groups such as the Citizens Advice Bureau (which continues successfully to offer assistance and advice to the community), and Crafting for Change (teaching craft skills for the young and not so young, which is going from strength to strength). In addition, this year for 2018, the Council has agreed to support a new well-being initiative to be held in the Library. The well-being meetings, led by an experienced therapist, aim to provide a FREE monthly wellbeing to anyone over 16. In addition, the extra opening times at the Library have been achieved by Friends of Stony Stratford Library (FOSSL).

offer and planned improvements.

The Town Crier is produced by the Town Council to keep you up to date with what we and other organisations are doing. We recognise the importance of distributing this newsletter in hard copy as well as using Social Media to communicate with residents. Our Information Officer, manages the Council noticeboards,

updating them weekly with information together with updating the revised Town Council website www.stonystratford.gov.uk and Facebook. The revamped website has now been running for a few months and includes many new features with the intention of informing residents about meetings, events and community group activities. Please let us know what you think of our new community website.

Grants: For the coming year, we are setting aside £5,000 for grants to local organisations wishing to run events or activities to help the community. During 2017/18, we have supported, amongst others; Folk on the Green, Stony Live, Riverside Festival, a new Tennis Club initiative, Stony Stratford in Bloom, the Big Draw and Lantern Festival, Christmas Lights Switch On, Act Out Drama, Friends of Stony Stratford Library, Horsefair Green together with Residents Associations. These groups, assisted by their army of volunteers, benefit from grants provided by the Town Council. The Big Draw and Lantern Festival both held at York House, have a very large and ever growing following. Grant application forms can be accessed via our website and advice on completing the form can be provided by the Town Clerk

Stony Stratford Neighbourhood Plan has been submitted to Milton Keynes Council and following the formal legal examination (which resulted in a number of changes), will go to referendum on Thursday 3rd May 2018 where residents will be able to vote on the Plan, to support it, and so ensure the vitality of the High Street and maintaining and improving essential green spaces.

The Town Council manages two **allotment sites**; the Wolverton Road Allotment and the Boundary Crescent site (which has undergone substantial improvements). The Town Council also owns the London Road site which is ably run by the Stony Stratford Allotment and Leisure Gardening Association. Allotment application forms are available on our website or contact the Deputy Town Clerk if you would like further information.

Landscape Maintenance: This is now the fourth year of our responsibility for landscape maintenance within the town – a task which we took over from Milton Keynes Council and for which we currently receive a grant to cover expenditure. The work is undertaken on our behalf by Marcus Young Landscaping. We

continue to believe that this is a critical contract for us as it gives us control over one of our most important assets: the open space that is clearly valued by the community. Managing the contract has also allowed us to make a number of improvements around the town: replacing hedging, removing overgrown shrubs and improving the overall look of the town. It is still uncertain if we will continue to receive a grant from MKC after March 2020.

Stony Stratford Floral Features, these are supported by the Business Association, Town Council and Stony in Bloom. From season to season and year to year, the work of Stony in Bloom volunteers together with our contractors, provide and maintain the fantastic displays that add colour and a feel-good factor to the Town. Although we budget £14,000 annually for this, the actual cost to the Town Council, after donations from the Business Association and fundraising by Stony in Bloom, is approximately half this cost.

Litter Picking in the Mill Field in which many volunteers are involved, youth activities at York House, the Farmers Market and maintenance of public toilets, dog and litter bins are other examples of some of the responsibilities of the Town Council.

MKPA summer play sessions for young people, Big Lunch, August Bank Holiday Fair and Apple Day, which have become annual events, are some of the services and activities currently supported by the Town Council. We understand that these well attended events are much appreciated by the community.

Projects: We are hoping to make substantial improvements to Mill Lane Car Park and increase the number of spaces. We are also investigating obtaining a grant from the Lottery Fund to provide more secure fencing for the Wolverton Road Allotments and working in partnership with Milton Keynes Council to obtain grants for replacement of the Wolverton Road Recreation Ground play equipment.

The Town Council/Councillors have excellent support from the Clerk, Deputy Clerk and Information Officer and I thank them and also fellow Councillors for their support to me as Chair.

We have some very difficult years ahead.

2018 marks Stony in Bloom's 10th will be a

anniversary and SSIB volunteers are planning a number of exciting projects to celebrate. Many of the volunteers who were involved from the start are still hard at work weeding, pruning and planting to keep the town looking beautiful - and little did we think when we began that it would take over our lives! Over the years our numbers have grown - which is just as well, because recently we counted up and realised that we'd created or transformed 38 perennial beds around the parish! We have 2 work parties a week to maintain the beds, and extra sessions before Britain in Bloom judging day. Though the Town Council pays for the flowers in the planters which we plant up twice a year, and the SSBA for the hanging baskets, SSIB volunteers fundraise for the 38 perennial beds with our fundraising meals at Calcutta Brasserie, plant sales and selling items at our Christmas Switch-On table. The Stony in Bloom greetings cards (of the London Rd hollyhocks and tree baskets) have been selling well. We've also secured grants from Milton Keynes Community Foundation and the National Grid for our work in the

A major project to celebrate the 10 years is the creation of a new bed on Fullers Slade opposite the FS bed on Slade Lane. Dominic Harris (Manor Drives) helped us prepare the ground, and Bunnings donated manure, compost and sand.



MK Community Foundation awarded us a grant of £200 towards the shrubs and annuals – and work has already begun with the planting of roses and a rowan tree.



When the earth is warmer we'll be planting lots more shrubs and bulbs so that there

will be a vibrant splash of colour to delight residents or those passing on the bus. The Rowans Centre, Youth Group and Fullers Slade residents will be helping with future planting there.





St Mary and St Giles School has just received its Level 3 and Level 4 Campaign for School Gardening certificates from the RHS - and with them, seeds and vegetable plants to the value of £250. Once again at the Big Lunch we'll be organising a hanging baskets activity for children, and hope to get sponsorship from McCarthy and Stone again this year to plant up hard-hats with the children to beautify the school and the McCarthy and Stone site.

Bard Sam Upton was congratulated by the Mayor of Milton Keynes Councillor David Hopkins. It was a wonderful evening and if you weren't there; here's a few words from the new Bard of Stony Stratford.

"My name is Sam Upton, I am a spoken word poet from Milton Keynes, previously

the 7th Bard of Northampton and now the 8th Bard of Stony Stratford.

I write about my life, experiences and how the world appears to me. When I perform I hope to share my emotions and be as honest as possible. I have performed live poetry in Milton Keynes, Stony Stratford, Northampton and London: these have ranged from open mics to literary events, local venues to festivals. I am also a poet for the Milton Keynes Living Archive and have worked with them to produce a poetic narrative to local wartime history for their production 'Works on War'.

I began writing and performing when I turned 26 in 2014. I love the power of words and for me poetry is the perfect medium. It allows for a shared emotional experience and being so honest whilst on stage is exhilarating and empowering. I use free verse with simple often direct language to break the notion that poetry can only exist in strict forms. My goal is to spread the spoken word and show others that as a creative platform its application is limitless.

Being the Bard is an honour and one I intend to do proud. It is a new tradition with ancient roots; and one I hope will spread and grow to other towns."
